Saturday, September 18 and follow-up Sunday, September 19 we will hold our Third Annual Sweep the Creek.

We are doing it again; rain or shine. We hope to get another big crowd this year. We plan to clean the entire creek of trash in one day—or one day and a little bit more. For the first time, we are holding the trash pick-up in Section 9 (Wheaton area) on Sunday. Over the years, many people throughout the park who observe the Sabbath on Saturday have asked us to hold some of our events on Sunday. So, if you observe a Saturday Sabbath, or if you can't come on Saturday for some other reason, join us Sunday in Section 9.

Tuesday, September 21 at 7:15 p.m. Program Meeting: The Birds of Sligo.

If you are a birder, aspire to be a birder or just want to know more about birds, you've got to come to this meeting. It promises to be a very interesting session. What migratory and year-round birds do we have in Sligo and what can we do to protect and improve their habitat? Two experts on birds will talk and entertain questions. Gail Mackiernan, who is surveying Sligo Creek Park for the Maryland Breeding Bird Atlas Project, will tell us about "The Breeding Birds of Sligo Creek: who, when and where -- an update from the ongoing Maryland Breeding Bird Atlas." Peter P. Marra, Senior Scientist with the Smithsonian Environmental Research Center, will then describe his research to determine the impact of West Nile Virus on our birds. Councilmember Perez is now more than halfway through his first term on the Montgomery County Council. Although elected to the Council by the District 5 residents of Takoma Park, Wheaton, Kensington, and parts of Silver Spring, the Sierra Club feels that he has worked for the good of the entire county. He serves on the Council's Health and Human Services Committee and also on the Transportation and Environment Committee, where he is lead Councilmember on the Environment. Considering his federal and nongovernment civil rights background, what insights has he gained through work as a legislator? What would you like to ask him about the county's future?

Native Plant Lovers Came Out In Droves to Walk with John Parrish

Botanist John Parrish's fame is spreading. Over 40 enthusiasts met on the path near the Kemp Mill Shopping Center August 15th to walk with him in the northmost section of Sligo Creek: He pointed out native plants—many we didn't know we had until he did his inventory.

Among plants that still exist in Sligo, John found wild strawberry, wild ginger, and in the sections below Piney Branch, saprophytic Indian pipes. A few more plants may inevitably appear, but John's list—now on the website—marks the formal close of a magnificent achievement. Already it has been useful

by informing whether a questionable plant is actually native to Sligo, and by narrowing down the choices when we identify plants. The inventory points out the urgency of our attack on invasives. News from the Invasives Front

General Gagne reports that two fierce invasives—Japanese Knotweed and Mile-a-Minute—are being held at bay. There's a chance we can keep them from getting established in the park. A third plant—Stilt Grass—may be gaining on us.

Also, please note that you can join the battle on Kudzu. See below.

- Friends of Sligo had removed most of the known Japanese Knotweed and then someone discovered roughly a half acre in the athletic field off Wayne at University. Four volunteers went to work on it but it was futile. Then Carole Bergmann came to the rescue. She will look for money for the Park to handle it. Thank you, Carole!
- The Mile-a-Minute crusade is moving forward, thanks to Marty Aument and crew in Kemp Mill, and to the Golf Course staff, who mobilized when they learned they had the plant bordering nearby Dallas Avenue, and got rid of it. We're left with two more big fields, which will have to wait for next year. Please report any Mile-a-Minute you see below Colesville Road as soon as possible, before seeds develop further.
- Stilt Grass may join the list of major problems. In areas with only a small amount of grass, we're experimenting with a weed eater. If anyone has a gasoline-powered Weed Eater to lend for use on small, scattered areas, the machine would be welcome during the week after the Sweep. Call Sally, 301-588-2071. sqaqne@erols.com
- There are two increasingly large patches of kudzu oozing forth on each side of the first hiker/biker bridge upstream from Park Valley Road. You can join other *Friends of Sligo Creek* on Saturday September 25th from 9:00 to 11:00 a.m. to attack Kudzu. *Friends* authorized by Park & Planning will follow up and apply herbicide to roots.

Free Native Plants for Your Yard

The developer building two houses right at the headwaters of Sligo Creek has agreed to let people dig up native plants at the property before he comes in with heavy equipment. So we have the weekend and at least Monday and Tuesday of next week to go dig. The property was lush with native plants, many of which have already been rescued by neighbors and *Friends*. What's left? A nice Amelanchiar and a Dogwood; a few Spice Bush; lots of Ash and Ironwood seedlings, some sedges, and lots of Sensitive Fern and New York Fern. There

is surely a lot more Jack in the Pulpit, but it's faded, so if you find little bulblets that don't seem to be garlic, they're probably Jacks. Usually there are many small ones if you find one larger one.

Please check in with Ed Murtagh or Leah Haygood before you come to get plants. Leah is willing to show the site during the day if you arrange a time with her (301-593-0012). Ed's number is 202-365-6526. He is usually available during the week after 4:00 p.m.

<u>Directions to the property:</u> Going north on Georgia Avenue, cross University Blvd and make a right on Arcola. Turn right onto Channing and drive to the dead end. If you walk straight ahead you are at the site at the end of Blue Ridge.

- Jack Seely, Pope Farm Facility Manager, M-NCPPC, will lead a tour of the historic facility on Wednesday, October 6 from 10:00 a.m. till noon. Meet at Pope Farm. Historic Pope Farm provides trees, shrubs, annuals, and perennials for the parks in Montgomery County. Come for a behindthe-scenes look at this 200-acres facility, including a guided tour of the greenhouses and production fields. - Joe Howard, Montgomery County Forestry Board and Carole Bergmann, Forest Ecologist, M-NCPPC will lead this fall's Champion Tree tour on Wednesday, October 13 from 9:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. The tour will focus on upper Montgomery County. You will see the magnificent Flora's Oak, which is a challenger to the new national champion white oak in Virginia; the champion ginkgo at the historic Stevens House in Poolesville; the state champion silver pendant linden; and Montgomery County's biggest Douglas fir. All together about a dozen champion trees will be visited, including the new national champion bigleaf magnolia in Garrett Park. You'll get a copy of the Montgomery County Register of Champion Trees. Bring a bag lunch for a picnic in a park along the way. Registration fee includes bus transportation and drinks. Bring a big lunch. Fee \$29, registration code 51.
